It was a unique opportunity to assist in the design and function of the new North Arbor building at the University of Houston-Clear Lake. An art professor rarely has the chance to help develop and help design a new facility in which to teach in. It is an honor for me to submit a proposal for public sculpture for the new and renovated site. I see this opportunity as a way to accentuate the BFA program at the UHCL campus. As a part of the university for the past eleven years teaching sculpture as well as being a MFA graduate from the University of Houston in 2002, I have a great appreciation to the University of Houston Clear Lake and the University of Houston. Thank you for taking the time to review my proposal.

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Artist Statement

"Moldable Subtractions"

As an avid kayaker I find it interesting that the basic design of the canoe and kayak to stay afloat and carry people has not changed over thousands of years. What has changed is the process by which these kayaks are crafted. Being an artist who is very rooted in and respectful of craftsmanship, I find this juxtaposition intriguing and rich with history. This series of sculptures explore the relationship between new and old technology and how craftsmanship maintains itself even when the base materials change.

Modern kayaks are constructed through intricate molds with injected plastic, fiberglass, and even carbon fiber. This is a stark contrast from the first canoes, which were carved directly from large trees. I want to create work that reveals this contrast. The work references the sleek design of the modern day kayak and at the same time acknowledges and respects the history of the design. Each sculpture is carved out of a single log. The exposed carved sections of the wood represent the modern day kayak, while the unfinished natural logs represent the history of the kayak.

Evolution of design with the constant thread of craftsmanship maintains the growth of form.

Proposal/Sculpture Description

My proposal consists of one vertical sculpture based on my current body of work. It will be located between the North and Central Arbor Building. This sculpture represents the idea of the finding something great from within. The historic dugout canoe that is made by carving it from one large tree will represent this concept, but with a modern twist. My interpretation will have a modern designed kayak exposed vertically from a large tree stump.

The kayak will be merging from a tree, yet to be fully revealed. The kayak will be constructed out of carbon steel and powder-coated a vibrant red. The symbolism behind this vibrant color design is two-fold. For one I wanted to reference the vibrant color palette modern kayak manufactures use today and I also wanted to express a harmonious color perspective. I wanted the piece to have both bold and balanced contrasts. I can visualize this sculpture catching the eye of students walking through the campus because of it's bold color and it's striking contrast against the building. I also believe the vibrant color of the sculpture will enhance the natural beauty of the campus through harmonious color schemes. Throughout the year the colors of the sculpture will create complementary and analogous color schemes with the campus's natural landscape.

The tree stump will be constructed of steel, metal lath, and colored concrete. The stump's color and texture will mimic the natural colors of the surrounding trees. There will be an anchoring foundation of rebar and concrete below ground level with exposed bolts for assembling the sculpture to the ground. An interior powder-coated steel support frame will be bolted to the foundation bolts. The kayak will then be bolted to the top of the support frame. The support frame will then be encased by a welded carbon steel armature mimicking the large tree stump. The armature will be faced with metal lath and finally covered and sculpted with colored concrete to finalize the appearance of a large tree stump growing up from the ground. All bolts, washers and nuts will be stainless steel (see page 8).

Location Description

Location 1 is located between the North and Central Arbor building. I have selected the natural area between the sidewalk and the southern side of the North arbor building. The illustration and dimensions of the sculpture can be seen in my sculpture illustration (see page 8). Location 1 is my first choice.

Location 2 is located midway along the sidewalk in front of the North Arbor and Central Arbor building. It is between the sidewalk and University Drive. Location 2 is my second choice.

Location 3 is an alternative design location. This design would change to a horizontal wall mounted sculpture. The sculpture would no longer be represented as to be merging from a tree and would be the skeletal framework of the kayak alone. The dimensions would be approximately 151" wide by 19.5" tall by 8" deep. Location 3 gives an interior option to my proposal and it is my third choice.

Location 4 is located at the entrance drive to the North Arbor building along University Drive. It is between the North Arbor building's drive entrance and the bridge over the bayou along the sidewalk. Location 4 is my forth choice.

These 4 locations are illustrated through site maps and photographs of the North Arbor Building (see pages 8-14).

Preliminary Foundation Design

The foundation design is for location 1, 2, & 4. The concrete will be reinforced with rebar. After discussing this project with Jan Mak, the Architect/Project Manager for UHCL, he felt the foundation design would be adequate for the project. He also feels the open frame design will help minimize any wind concerns. The foundation's final design might change if a civil engineer needs to review and certify it. The top of the foundation will be flush with ground level (see page15).

Safety & Liability

I have one safety and liability issue with the piece. It's ability to with stand hurricane force winds. I feel this issue can be taken care of by a civil engineer, certifying the final overall design.

As a faculty member I feel it is important to broaden university students. I could see working collaboratively with the Civil Engineer Program at the University of Houston to engage more than just our art program students. As I plan to have UHCL's art students involved from start to finish with my project. The Civil Engineer program at University of Houston could use this opportunity with their classes. A class could discuss and work on the design of the kayak's anchoring foundation and it's support frame structure. They could discuss all civil codes dealing with this type of public sculpture. The Civil Engineer professor could possibly certify the sculpture to be ready for installation?

Maintenance

Maintenance issues should be minimal since the materials for this piece will be powder-coated steel and colored concrete. An occasional washing with a low-pressured pressure washer should be sufficient for cleaning the sculpture. I will not be responsible for any cleaning and any repairs to the sculpture once installed. An art conservator or myself can be asked to enter a bid for such issues if they may arise.

Accessibility








