Terminology



A Common Language

- transgender or trans umbrella term for many gender nonconforming identities
- trans woman = MTF, trans man = FTM, transsexual
- Passing, stealth

Today's workshop will focus on trans people who identify on the <u>binary!</u>



Sexual Orientation vs. Gender Identity

- Sexual orientation is distinct from gender identity
 - Shelly is a lesbian, that is their...
 - Michael is nonbinary, that is their...
 - Taylor is a bisexual, that is their...
 - Jamie is woman, that is her...
 - Quinn is a genderqueer, that is their...
 - Lorraine is queer, that is their...



Sexual Orientation

- T's can be LGBQ!
 - Trans man attracted to men: Gay man
 - Trans man attracted to women: Straight man
 - Trans woman attracted to women: Lesbian woman
 - Trans woman attracted to men: Straight woman
 - Trans woman or man attracted to both/all: Bisexual woman or man



Gender Expression

Transition Basics

- Three types: mental, social, and medical
- Mental Transition: an individual begins to identify with a gender other than that assigned to them at birth.
- Social Transition: an individual starts asserting their identified gender in society
- Medical Transition: an individual seeks medical intervention in order to achieve their desired gender presentation – hormones, surgeries
- Note that just because a person does not medically transition does not mean that they are any less trans. A person's gender identity is not dependent on the desire for or access to medical transition.



Harmful Effects of Misgendering

- Ask any trans person, and they can tell you how awful being misgendered makes them feel.
 - Invalidating of their identity
 - Disrespectful, isolating, uncomfortable, and hated
 - It tells them that they should hide who they really are, that people will never fully accept them.
 - Causes real psychological harm.



Harmful Effects on Mental Health

- Psychological distress (39% vs. 5%)
- Lifetime suicide attempts (40% vs 4.6%)

Ally Behavior

- Be open to allow a full range of gender and human expression that is not tied to bodies or chromosomes or assigned sex.
- Understand sexual orientation. A transgender person may identify as gay, straight, bisexual, or may resist labels altogether.
- Understand that transition looks different for everyone. It does not always include hormones and/or surgery.
- Faculty "I want to respect all gender identities in this classroom, so please let me know if I misgender you."



Ally Behavior

- Become comfortable in public restrooms with people who may not match the little signs on the rest room doors.
- If you are not sure which pronouns to use, ask in a respectful, polite manner. Asking is not rude, but rather courteous and caring.
- Use inclusive language, such as asking a person if they are in a relationship, rather than specifically asking if they have a girl/boyfriend.
- Respect the name they use for themself even if it isn't their government name.
- Practice using gender neutral pronouns, such as they, them, theirs.



Things to Avoid

- Don't assume someone has to "pass" to have a successful transition
- Don't ask "Have you completed your transition?"
- Don't ask "How transitioned are you?"
- Don't ask about a person's "real" name or use a person's dead name when referring to their past.



Oops! I Used the Wrong Pronouns...

What NOT to do

- Make excuses.
 - "I'm sorry, but you look fe/male."
- Make it about you.
 - "Oh my god. I'm SO embarrassed. I had no idea."
- Get defensive.
 - "It was just an accident. You should be grateful that I'm trying."

What to do

- Apologize.
 - "I'm so sorry. Thank you for correcting me."
 - "I'm so sorry. I will work on that."
- Correct yourself.
 - "She.. I mean.. He is awesome."
- Move on.
 - Don't excessively apologize and draw more attention to your mistake than necessary.



Scenario 1

Pat: Hey, Alex! This is Chris, she's my.. I mean he's my lab

partner."

Alex to Chris: Oh, hey! Nice to meet you Chris.

Chris to Alex: Likewise.



Scenario 2

Alex to Taylor: Wow, Taylor! Your outfit is amazing today.

Pat to Alex: You're right. He does look great!

Taylor to Alex: Actually, my pronouns are She/Her/Hers.

Pat: (Practice appropriate response.)

Now, as a group, what are appropriate ways you responded or intervened?

Preferred Name
