## **HEERF I/CARES Act**

- Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF I), part of the CARES Act, passed March 27, 2020
- Institutions received allocations through the Department of Ed (ED), based on 77% of Pell eligible students, 23% non-Pell eligible
  - required to spend one-half on emergency grants
  - one-half on institutional expenses
- Emergency grants had to go directly to students; couldn't use to pay balances
- Language in the law was highly restrictive:
  - "due to the disruption of campus operations due to COVID-19"

- UH: \$18,351,642
  - Combination of blanket grants and applications
- UH Downtown: \$4,728,325
  - Combination of blanket grants and applications
- UH Clear Lake: \$2,777,685
  - Combination of blanket grants and applications
- UH Victoria: \$1,116,503
  - Awarded through an application process

## HEERF II/CRRSAA

- Law was signed on December 27, 2020
  - Removed language limiting funds to "disruption of campus operations"
  - Emphasis on students with extreme need
- Received ongoing guidance through April, 2021
  - Hard to award when rules change along the way
- Schools received the same allocation as for HEERF I
  - Same requirements for 50/50: emergency grants/institutional funds
- Emergency grants can now be used for past due balances, as long as the student authorizes school to pay toward the balance

## HEERF II/CRRSAA

- UH: \$18,351,642
  - Combination of blanket grants and applications
  - Applications still in progress
- UH Downtown: \$4,728,325
  - Combination of blanket grants and applications
  - Applications still in progress
- UH Clear Lake: \$2,777,685
  - Combination of blanket grants and applications
  - All disbursed
- UH Victoria: \$1,116,503
  - Awarded through an application process
  - Applications still in progress

## HEERF III/ARP

- Substantially higher allocations for HEERF III
  - Slightly more required to go to emergency grants versus institutional expenses
  - Acceptable institutional expenses are lost revenue, reimbursement for incurred expenses, technology costs for distance education, faculty and staff trainings, payroll
  - International, DACA and undocumented students now eligible
- Focus is on students with extreme need
  - Distribution plans still in progress
- One year to spend

### HEERF III/ARP

#### • UH: \$54,713,989

- Will be distributed through an application process
- Not yet begun
- UH Downtown: \$16,500,000
  - Disbursement plan in development
- UH Clear Lake: \$9,010,174
  - Disbursement plan in development
- UH Victoria: \$3,668,435
  - Disbursement plan in development

## **GEER Emergency Grants**

- Through CARES Act, institutions also received money from the Governors Emergency Education Relief Funds for grants to students
- Some awarded as emergency grants, some awarded as additional TEXAS Grant allocations

## **GEER Emergency Grants**

- UH:
  - Emergency Grants: \$3,178,456
  - TEXAS Grants: \$3,094,632
- UH Downtown
  - Emergency Grants: \$1,094,498
  - TEXAS Grants: \$1,131,303
- UH Clear Lake
  - Emergency Grants: \$624,431
  - TEXAS Grants: \$645,428
- UH Victoria
  - Emergency Grants: \$300,178
  - TEXAS Grants: None

#### **MSI Funds**

- Schools designated by ED as Minority Serving Institutions received additional funding
- Not required to spend on emergency grants to students, but some institutions allocated a portion for this

## **MSI Emergency Grants**

- UH:
  - Emergency Grants: \$1,032,527
- UH Downtown
  - Emergency Grants: \$397,657
- UH Clear Lake
  - Emergency Grants: \$406,754
- UH Victoria
  - Emergency Grants: None
