NEWS FROM THE UH SYSTEM

May is a very special time of year – as symbolically important as the first day of classes in the fall semester – in that it brings with it commencement ceremonies throughout the UH System.

This year, the University of Houston conducted four “general commencements,” plus separate commencements for the three professional colleges (Optometry, Law, Pharmacy). UH-Clear Lake conducted two ceremonies, and UH-Downtown and UH-Victoria one each.

NEWS FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON

■ UH Commencement

Honorary degrees:

The University of Houston resumed the tradition of awarding honorary degrees at this year's ceremonies. Doctor of Humane Letters degrees, *honoris causa*, went to **John Hofmeister**, former chair of the Greater Houston Partnership and current chair of the UH Energy Advisory Board, for his Tier One advocacy and support, and to **Lyle Lovett**, songwriter and musicians, for his philanthropic work, including support for the Gerald D. Hines College of Architecture.

President's Medallion:

Three President's Medallions were awarded this year. Honorees were the **Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo**, with the Medallion being accepted by “Butch Robinson,” Chairman of the HLS&R Board; **Carl Lewis**; and **Wilhelmina Cullen Robertson Smith** (posthumously), with the Medallion being accepted by UH System Regent Carroll Ray Robertson, with more than a dozen members of the Robertson and Cullen families in attendance at the ceremony.

Students came from 38 states and 75 nations, and received degrees in 88 disciplines. The youngest graduate in the entire Class of 2010 was Ms. **Alistair Fisher**, BS, psychology, at 19. The oldest graduate in entire Class of 2010 was Mr. **Jim Bingley**, Ph.D., history, at 74.

Lt. Governor **David Dewhurst** stopped by at two commencements, Pharmacy and Architecture/Engineering/Natural Sciences and Mathematics, and delivered greetings to the graduates and guests. Former New York Mayor **Rudy Giuliani**, now a partner in the Bracewell & Giuliani law firm, delivered the commencement address at the UH Law Center.

A moving moment was shared by thousands of students and guests at the Architecture/Engineering/Natural Sciences and Mathematics commencement when a 91-year old veteran of two war, Mr. **John Rogers**, got to “walk” 60 years after receiving his degree in mechanical engineering, something he was unable to do in 1950, as he was on his way to Korea to serve his country when his class graduated. His photo appeared in the Sunday, May 16, edition of The Houston Chronicle.

■ Student Success

Out of 2,902 students who graduated with a bachelor's degree this May, almost half graduated with academic honors – an impressive validation of our efforts to promote student success. 510 undergraduates who earned a cumulative grade point average from 3.25 to 3.49 on their last 66 hours at UH graduated “cum laude” – with honors. 438 students who earned a cumulative grade point average from 3.50 to 3.74 on their last 66 hours graduated “magna cum laude” – with high honors. And 238 students who earned a cumulative grade point average from 3.75 to 4.0 on their last 66 hours graduated “summa cum laude” – with highest honors – an extraordinarily difficult honor to achieve! Eight students graduated with a perfect 4.0.

■ Nationally Competitive Research

Year-to-date research awards are up 10 % at \$72.5 million, and Federal awards are up 60 % at \$41.4 million. In the important category of research expenditures, by which we are measured for Tier One recognition, we are up 20 % at \$53.8 million, and Federal expenditures are up 26 % at \$27 million. Of note is the fact that, reflecting the university's strategic move toward research “clusters” and collaborative projects, which yield higher awards than single-researcher projects, multi-principal-investigator awards are up 134 % for a total of \$48.6 million.

Following on the heels of the move to Houston of Jan Åke Gustafsson and the establishment of his Center for Nuclear Receptors and Cell Signaling, and the return to Houston of Venkat Selvamanikam, whose research team is doing pioneering work in the manufacture of flexible, superconducting wire, a third research “cluster” is now at home on the UH campus. The National Science Foundation's National Center for Airborne Laser Mapping (NCALM), has relocated here from the University of Florida. NCALM is UH's first and only NSF-supported

center. The center, headed by **Ramesh Shrestha**, is conducting research that will benefit such areas of strategic importance to the nation as homeland security, disaster recovery, oil and gas exploration, wind farm site planning, and environmental studies. Based on historical information, revenues generated by the center are anticipated to be approximately \$1 million per year, and will be reinvested in the program.

■ **Community Advancement**

Hundreds of guests from the community and from campus celebrated the grand opening of the Hilton University of Houston April 22. A multi-million-dollar renovation will make the hotel and conference center – which serves as a gateway to the university – even more attractive to the numerous area civic groups, non-profit organizations, and business and professional groups that hold their meetings there. Houston Mayor **Annise Parker** joined Conrad N. Hilton College of Hotel and Restaurant Management administrators and students in cutting a ceremonial red ribbon for the grand opening. The hotel and conference center has been transformed into a “tier one” facility thanks to a generous gift from the Hilton Foundation. The grand opening ceremony capped the college’s 40th anniversary celebration. If you haven’t visited the renovated facilities, I encourage you to do so soon – you will not recognize the place!

UHCL is among 30 colleges and universities in Texas (see UH-Downtown news) and more than 700 across the nation to receive Honor Roll recognition for its commitment to volunteering, service-learning and civic engagement. Administered by The Corporation for National and Community Service, the award is the highest federal recognition a university or college can receive for such initiatives.

■ The Society of Human Resource Management recognized UHCL's **Master of Arts in Human Resource Management** with full competency status, making it one of only 47 programs in the United States that has received this certification. UHCL's graduate program is offered completely online and is fully accredited by AACSB International – The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business.

■ UHV's **School of Business Administration** has completed its fifth-year review and maintained its business accreditation by AACSB International – The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. Less than 6 % of business schools worldwide have earned this distinguished hallmark of excellence in management education from the organization, the longest-serving global accrediting body for business schools offering undergraduate and graduate degrees. To maintain accreditation, a business program undergoes a rigorous review every five years during which the school must demonstrate its continued commitment to the 21 quality standards relating to faculty qualification, strategic management and assurance of learning.

■ The Association of Small Business Development Centers has reaccredited the **UHV Small Business Development Center** for the next five years. The UHV-SBDC has assisted thousands of small businesses and new ventures in an eleven-county area since its inception, including identifying opportunities, accessing capital, starting or expanding, franchising, leasing or buying, market analysis, and others.

■ UHV will offer an **Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps Affiliate Program** this fall in collaboration with the University of Houston. The program will be coordinated by the UHV School of Education & Human Development. The school's dean, Lawrence Rossow, is a retired U.S. Army captain.
