FY2018 One-Time Request #1 – Martin Luther King Jr. /Weeks of Welcome Day of Service

Building on the continued growth of the program, the Center for Student Involvement plans to continue offering Days of Service on a permanent basis during Weeks of Welcome and in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. During FY17, the two Days of Service engaged 420 students, faculty, and staff in service projects throughout the city of Houston. CSI partnered with the Office of Community Relations, the Metropolitan Volunteer Program, Student Housing and Residential Life, Bauer College of Business, the Office of Sustainability, the Center for Diversity and Inclusion, the Church at UH, and Baptist Student Ministry to host the two events. CSI prioritizes working with nonprofit organizations located in the Third Ward. Between the two Days of Service, the UH community contributed 1,260 volunteer hours, valued at a contribution of \$30,416.40 (the Independent Sector values one hour of volunteer service at \$24.14). The University of Houston is an important part of the city of Houston and has a responsibility to not only provide educational and growth experiences to its students, but to positively impact the surrounding community.

The purpose of a day of service is to:

- Instill a sense of community spirit and involvement during the first weeks of class each semester
- Encourage personal growth through exposure to new populations and projects
- Raise awareness of social issues in the Houston community
- Create a networking opportunity for students to make new friends and meet community members
- Honor the spirit of MLK Day through participating in a nationally recognized Day of Service
- Raise the profile of the University of Houston by being visible in the community

FY2018 One-Time Request #2 – Alternative Service Breaks

During Spring 2017, the Center for Student Involvement (CSI) offered three regional Alternative Service Break (ASB) trips. One group traveled to New Orleans to work with community development, one group traveled to Killeen, Texas to work with youth with disabilities, and the third group traveled to Ardmore, Oklahoma to focus on environmental sustainability. The ASB program allowed 50 students to learn about social issues, the needs of at-risk populations, and gain an appreciation of other cultures through in-depth, immersive service experiences.

Alternative Spring Break can provide an opportunity for students:

- to develop leadership skills through navigating team dynamics
- travel to new areas with exposure to new cultures
- learn about relevant social issues in the Houston community through service projects
- develop a stronger sense of citizenship, all while positively representing the University of Houston

ASB trips include a series of pre-trip meetings that include an introduction to concepts of community engagement, social justice, and sustainable, positive change. Future regional trips can be held in nearby cities such as San Antonio, Corpus Christi, or New Orleans which all offer hands- on service opportunities and cultural and fun experiences. The overall purpose of an ASB trip is to provide the full-immersion experience over spring break with the goal of taking that knowledge and experience back to one's own community to continue making an impact. According to Break Away – a national Alternative Break clearinghouse - the average student pays \$244 for an alternative break trip. The ASB trips are co-led by trained students and supported by staff/graduate assistants.

FY2018 One-Time Request #3 – ServeUH Initiatives

For the first time in FY17, the University of Houston was selected as a NASPA Lead Initiative Institution. This prestigious designation was granted to less than 100 institutions, and has given UH access to resources and a network of institutions that have proven to be effective in the development of civic learning and democratic engagement programs. During FY17, ServeUH launched the EPIC Question Wall, an interactive, written dialogue for students to engage in conversations around current events. In spring 2017, CSI partnered with the Center for Diversity & Inclusion, the Metropolitan Volunteer Program, Asha Vida, and Nourish International at UH to sponsor UH's first Hunger Banquet. The Hunger Banquet serves as a signature program for ServeUH, providing an opportunity for students to learn about hunger from the local to global level through a simulation experience.

The goals of ServeUH are:

- To provide a broader range of experiences for students allowing us to empower students to become active, global citizens who lead with a lifelong commitment to service.
- To further the development of signature programs focused on addressing social issue education and civil discourse (Hunger Banquet, One Night Without A Home).
- To continue expanding our tracking of volunteer service hours to support more students earning the President's Volunteer Service Award.

In August, CSI partnered with SHRL to launch the Impact Living Learning Community. Impact provides students the opportunity to build a network with their peers through service and engaging in the local community. The CoogsGive initiative will also begin during FY18. This will be a monthly initiative for UH

to support local organizations and social issues through donating small items such as school supplies, toiletries, etc. In Spring 2018, CSI will launch a new event, One Night Without A Home. This program will help students gain a deeper understanding and knowledge of homelessness through a series of activities. As ServeUH continues to develop, we will look to deepen existing partnerships and develop new partnerships both across campus and in the community. In the wake of Hurricane Harvey, it is imperative that we provide students with ways to engage in and support the community through social issue education and service opportunities.

In order to be intentional in our programming and be inclusive of multiple perspectives, we collaborate with various groups and departments in order to generate ideas, plan, and staff the event. This year, collaborators include the Residence Hall Association, Student Program Board, Student Centers, and the Center for Diversity and Inclusion. We also have volunteer opportunities for students to get involved and contribute to the success of each event.

Each InfraRED event includes the following:

• Unique event ideas with separate themes and activities.

- A major attraction such as a live musical performance or interactive novelty, with additional supporting activities to provide diverse involvement opportunities.
- Incentives for attending, including Pindamonium buttons, free shirts, novelties and prize drawings.

The 2017-2018 InfraRED series saw a 52.6% increase in attendees (598 students) from the 2016-2017 InfraRED series. FY2019 One-Time Request #4 – RSO Graduate Assistant

The first strategic initiative in the Division of Student Affairs and Enrollment Services Strategic Plan is to "Create new opportunities for student success through learning, engagement and discovery." The Center for Student Involvement has initiated the establishment of new opportunities for student leaders by developing and implementing services and programs that support registered student organization student leader success.

RSO student leader programs were hosted during the 2016-2017 school year include:

- 30 Risk Management and Organization Orientation Sessions
- 25 Student Organization Leadership Development (SOLD) Sessions
- 6 Cougar Connection Series Workshops
- 2 Cat's Back RSO Fairs
- 2 Student Organization Leadership & Advancement Retreats (SOLAR)

 - Student Organization Best Practice Consultations

The Assistant Director and Activities Coordinator for RSO Services spearhead the planning and implementation of these events, and additional assistance is needed as more programs are added. This position was One-Time funded for Spring 2015, FY16, and FY17. A Graduate Assistant dedicated to Registered Student Organization Services is extremely advantageous as it provides the additional support that is needed to continue the good work in this area and expand its offerings for over 500 registered student organizations.

A Graduate Assistant in RSO Services would have the following duties:

- Scheduling, facilitating, and developing risk management trainings
 - A considerable amount of the Activities Coordinator/Assistant Director for RSO Services time is spent scheduling and facilitating Risk Management sessions. Due to the vast amount of Risk Management sessions (30 two hour sessions between summer and fall 2016) the current RSO team cannot solely focus on developing a more robust Student Organization leader experience.
- Organizing and maintaining risk management records
- Cougar Involvement Ambassadors
 - Personal Involvement Consultations with students
 - Student Organization Best Practice Consultations
 - Carrel Area Management
 - Involvement Resources

Each year, thousands of students submit Commitments to Action in five categories: Education, Environment & Climate Change, Peace and Human Rights, Poverty Alleviation, and Public Health. Universities dedicated to supporting CGIU become a part of the University Network can commit to funding both travel to CGIU and financial support for accepted Commitments to Action. FY2019 Base Augmentation Request #1 – Martin Luther King Jr./Weeks of Welcome Day of Service

Building on the continued growth of the program, the Center for Student Involvement plans to continue offering Days of Service on a permanent basis during Weeks of Welcome and in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. During FY17, the two Days of Service engaged 420 students, faculty, and staff in service projects throughout the city of Houston. CSI partnered with the Office of Community Relations, the Metropolitan Volunteer Program, Student Housing and Residential Life, Bauer College of Business, the Office of Sustainability, the Center for Diversity and Inclusion, the Church at UH, and Baptist Student Ministry to host the two events. CSI prioritizes working with nonprofit organizations located in the Third Ward. Between the two Days of Service, the UH community contributed 1,260 volunteer hours, valued at a contribution of \$30,416.40 (the Independent Sector values one hour of volunteer service at \$24.14). The University of Houston is an important part of the city of Houston and has a responsibility to not only provide educational and growth experiences to its students, but to positively impact the surrounding community.

The purpose of a day of service is to:

- Instill a sense of community spirit and involvement during the first weeks of class each semester
- Encourage personal growth through exposure to new populations and projects
- Raise awareness of social issues in the Houston community
- Create a networking opportunity for students to make new friends and meet community members
- Honor the spirit of MLK Day through participating in a nationally recognized Day of Service
- Raise the profile of the University of Houston by being visible in the community

FY2019 Base Augmentation Request #2 – Alternative Service Breaks

During Spring 2017, the Center for Student Involvement (CSI) offered three regional Alternative Service Break (ASB) trips. One group traveled to New Orleans to work with community development, one group traveled to Killeen, Texas to work with youth with disabilities, and the third group traveled to Ardmore, Oklahoma to focus on environmental sustainability. The ASB program allowed 50 students to learn about social issues, the needs of at-risk populations, and gain an appreciation of other cultures through in-depth, immersive service experiences.

Alternative Spring Break can provide an opportunity for students:

- to develop leadership skills through navigating team dynamics
- travel to new areas with exposure to new cultures
- learn about relevant social issues in the Houston community through service projects
- develop a stronger sense of citizenship, all while positively representing the University of Houston

ASB trips include a series of pre-trip meetings that include an introduction to concepts of community engagement, social justice, and sustainable, positive change. Future regional trips can be held in nearby cities such as San Antonio, Corpus Christi, or New Orleans which all offer hands- on service opportunities and cultural and fun experiences. The overall purpose of an ASB trip is to provide the full-immersion experience over spring break with the goal of taking that knowledge and experience back to one's own community to continue making an impact. According to Break Away – a national Alternative Break clearinghouse - the average student pays \$244 for an alternative break trip. The ASB trips are co-led by trained students and supported by staff/graduate assistants.

FY2019 Base Augmentation Request #3 – ServeUH Initiatives

For the first time in FY17, the University of Houston was selected as a NASPA Lead Initiative Institution. This prestigious designation was granted to less than 100 institutions, and has given UH access to resources and a network of institutions that have proven to be effective in the development of civic learning and democratic engagement programs. During FY17, ServeUH launched the EPIC Question Wall, an interactive, written dialogue for students to engage in conversations around current events. In spring 2017, CSI partnered with the Center for Diversity & Inclusion, the Metropolitan Volunteer Program, Asha Vida, and Nourish International at UH to sponsor UH's first Hunger Banquet. The Hunger Banquet serves as a signature program for ServeUH, providing an opportunity for students to learn about hunger from the local to global level through a simulation experience.

The goals of ServeUH are:

- To provide a broader range of experiences for students allowing us to empower students to become active, global citizens who lead with a lifelong commitment to service.
- To further the development of signature programs focused on addressing social issue education and civil discourse (Hunger Banquet, One Night Without A Home).
- To continue expanding our tracking of volunteer service hours to support more students earning the President's Volunteer Service Award.

In August, CSI partnered with SHRL to launch the Impact Living Learning Community. Impact provides students the opportunity to build a network with their peers through service and engaging in the local community. The CoogsGive initiative will also begin during FY18.
