The power of the organization lies in its student senators, representing and speaking on behalf of the fellow member of their colleges, to develop policy and legislation at the bi-weekly meetings of the senate and its committees. The executive branch then collaborates with the stakeholders and programs on campus to help develop and execute those policies. Further, the multitude of university committees and workgroups with SGA delegates serve to represent students on important policy and decision-making processes in nearly all facets of the university's operation.



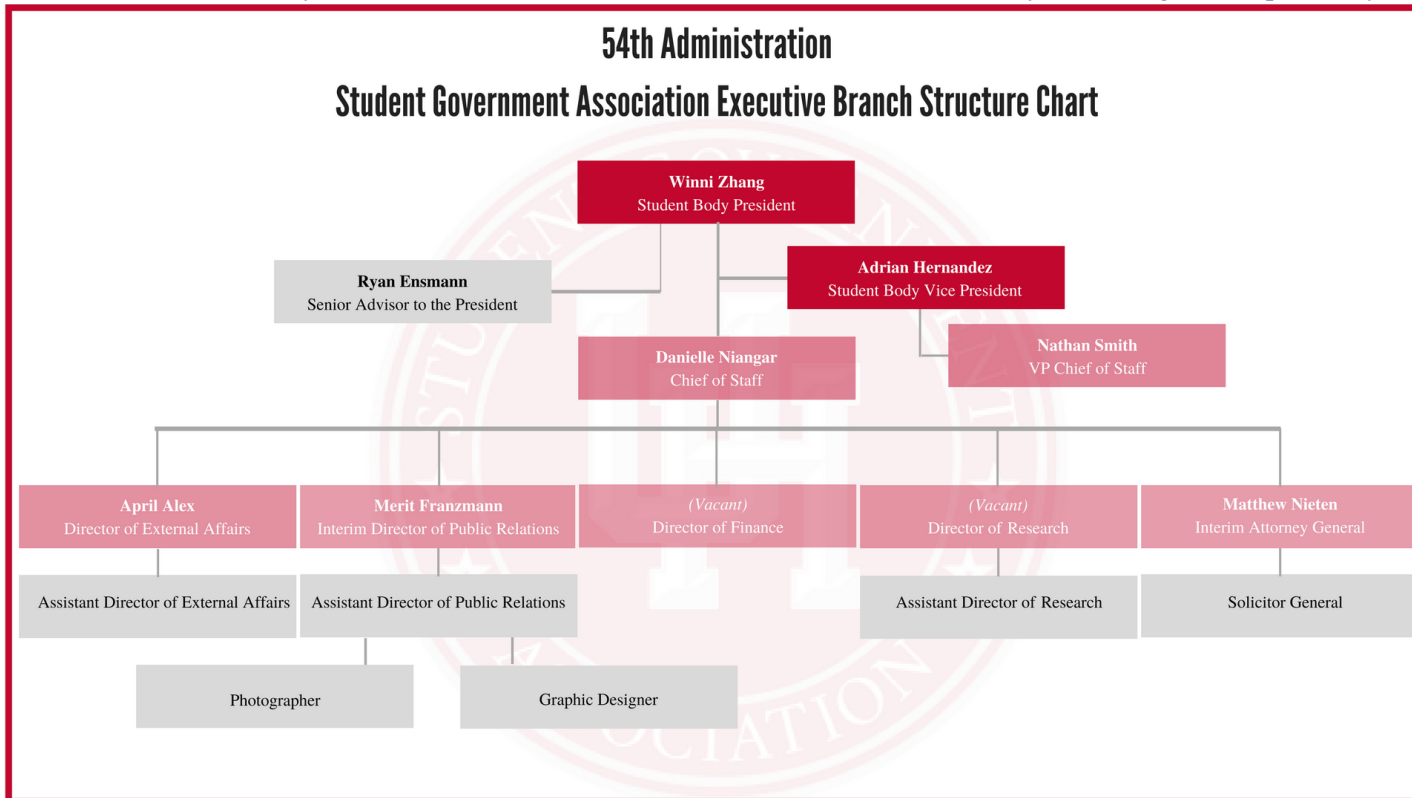

Student Government Association is divided into three branches: The Executive Branch, the Legislative Branch, and the Judicial Branch.

Executive Branch

The Executive Power of the Student Government Association is vested in the elected student body President and Vice-President. The Cabinet is appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. The main role of the Executive Branch is to carry out the legislation passed by the Senate.

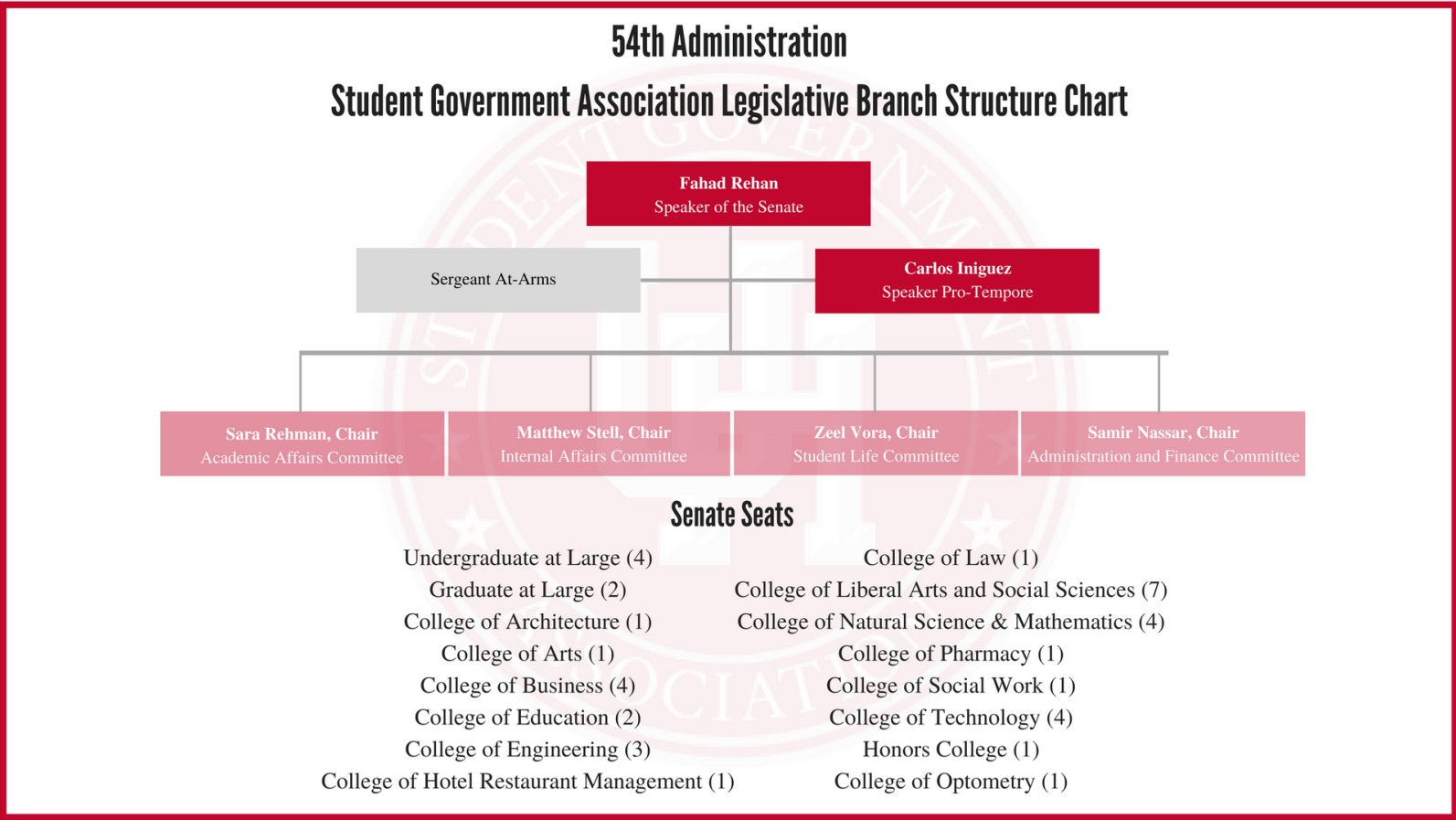




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Legislative Branch

The Legislative power of the Student Government Association is vested in the Student Senate. Through legislation the Senate works toward improving the student experience at the University of Houston. The Speaker of the Senate is elected from within the Senate and presides over general meetings of the Senate, heads the Legislative Branch, assigns senators to standing committees, and sets meeting agendas and times. Other Senate officers include the Speaker Pro-Tempore (who presides over the Senate in the absence of the Speaker) and committee chairs. Four (4) undergraduate At-Large and two (2) graduate At-Large senators are elected by the entire student body. Every college elects representation in the Senate based on student population. Each of the Senators serves on at least one of the standing committees of the Senate.





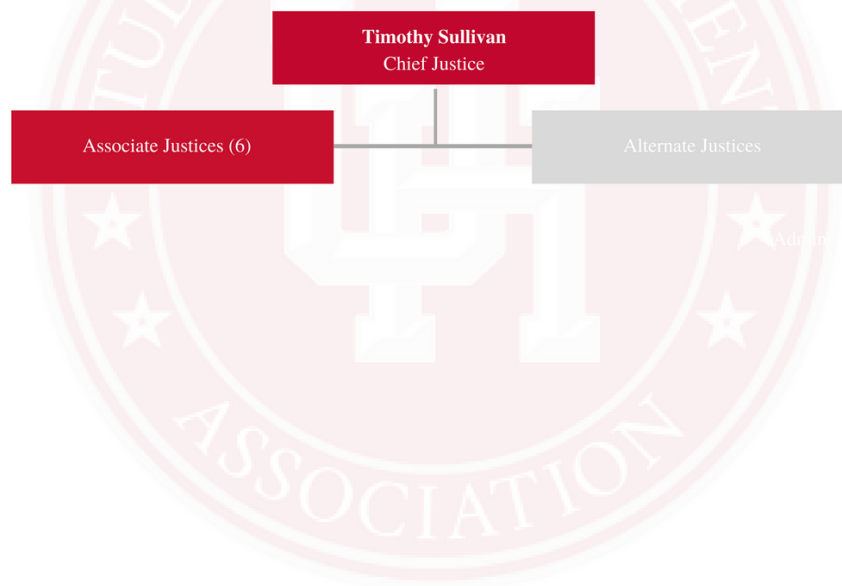
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Judicial Branch

The Judiciary of the Student Government Association is vested in the Court of Appeals. The Court is comprised of the Chief Justice and six (6) Associate Justices who are appointed by the President and serve until graduation. The Court of Appeals is the Supreme Court for SGA and hears matters involved the constitutionality of legislation, disputes between branches, and is the court of last resort for election issues.

Each year, the Student Body President releases an executive agenda outlining the goals for the administration. The agenda, as shown above, includes the initiatives we hope to achieve, the exact measured outcomes we hope to see, the project lead, and the partner(s) established for each initiative. If items are accomplished or started, the project will be marked as successful. Each Student Body President is elected by the student body to carry out their specific vision for the University. It is important for a governing institution to set clear goals and objectives for the year. While these executive agendas define these goals and objectives, it does not limit the organization. Throughout the year, SGA may find value or importance in other initiatives. However, ultimately, we will prioritize the successful implementation of each project on this agenda.



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In addition to this, Student Government Association's goals and initiatives ultimately impact every student at the University of Houston. In some cases, our reach goes beyond the students at the University of Houston. Student Government Association works with local community members, public schools around Houston, and prospective Cougars. It is not uncommon for SGA to visit K-12 schools to talk about the importance of college and to represent the University of Houston. Initiatives such as the implementation of the Common App as an accepted form of application for the University of Houston affect prospective Cougars around the nation.

While our initiatives impact the entire student body, we can offer the following participation/engagement rates:

1. Emerging Leaders program – 20 freshmen
2. Chinese Star Replacement Survey: 4,351 respondents
3. Transfer Focus Group: 40 students
4. UH Night at the Houston Dynamo Game: 300 student tickets sold
5. End the Stigma 2017 Facebook statistics: 252 went/interested in event. 9,200 reached, 1,200 viewed
6. End the Stigma 2016 Facebook statistics: 253 went/interested in event
7. Coogs Vote Rally Facebook statistics: 88 went/interested in event
8. Candlelit Vigil for Suicide Awareness Facebook Statistics: 704 went/interested in event. 28,000 reached. 2,300 viewed.

The Student Government Association holds its elections in the Spring and a new executive team assumes office in April 1st. Each administration is responsible for its budget proposal given the SFAC approved funding in their respective fiscal year. This creates some level of ambiguity in the budget, as it is impossible to know precisely what the next administration will choose to allocate their budget to, but there have not been any drastic changes.

SGA changed one cabinet position this year. The former Deputy Chief of Staff is now the Vice President Chief of Staff. The Vice President Chief of Staff offers more help than the Deputy Chief of Staff would traditionally be able to do. The Vice President Chief of Staff assists the



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Vice President and the Chief of Staff with their projects and work load. This position has increased the productivity of the Vice President allowing them to focus on multiple initiatives while balancing committee appointments.

For the past two years, SGA has voluntarily decreased our budget by 5% for FY17 and 1% for FY18 in an attempt to set an example for other organizations to follow in suit. We appreciate SFAC's flexibility in including this question in the questionnaire. In the event that SGA's budget be cut by 5% (\$7100+ \$420 6% administration fee) we would accommodate in the following ways:

If SGA suffered these cuts to our budget, we would be unable to adequately communicate with the student body, operate our offices, and host programs/events that are critical to student success and experience on campus. In addition to this, the awards at the end of the year banquet for SGA are not only awarded to student leaders, both in and outside of SGA, who have exceeded expectations in serving the student body, but also faculty and staff that have made a huge difference and impact on our campus. Cutting the quality of the awards damages both the reputation of SGA and the prestige of the awards.

Student Government Association does not receive any additional funding from other sources. At this time, there does not appear to be other manners in which SGA could receive funding, but we are prepared to pursue such avenues if they become accessible.

The Student Government Association is unique in that it serves as the main advocacy body for the students at this university. As referenced by state law, it fills the statutory role of an elected student representation. There is very little overlap, if any, with other fee funded units.
