The Faculty of Social Work of the University of Manitoba invites applications for a **tenure-track position** at the Assistant Professor level beginning on 1 July 2014, or as soon as possible thereafter. The successful candidate will be based at the Faculty's Northern Social Work Program in Thompson, Manitoba.

Candidates with a variety of backgrounds and interests in Social Work will be considered. The Faculty is particularly interested in candidates with expertise and experience in social work practice in Northern and Indigenous communities, and with teaching and research interests grounded in Indigenous perspectives on child welfare, community health, and social development.

Candidates should have a PhD completed or near completion at the time of application, and at least one other degree from an accredited social work program. A successful candidate who holds a MSW and who is pursuing a PhD will be appointed to a term position at the rank of Lecturer until completion of the PhD, and must successfully complete the PhD within the mutually accepted time period.

Candidates for this position must have the ability to teach effectively at the undergraduate and graduate level, to supervise graduate students, and to develop a strong and ongoing program of research and publication. Candidates should also be familiar with the use of on-line, blended and other modes for the distance delivery of social work education. Salary will be commensurate with experience and qualifications.

The Faculty of Social Work is one of the largest social work programs in Canada, with a proud history of teaching, research and service spanning more than 70 years. The Faculty offers Bachelor, Master, and PhD degrees in Social Work, and is accredited by the Canadian Association for Social Work Education. Our Faculty has three physical sites (the main Fort Garry campus, the Inner City of Winnipeg, and the Northern in Thompson) as well as a virtual campus that teaches students from across Canada. As a Faculty within the University of Manitoba, we are part of the U15 group of large, research-intensive Canadian Universities. Our Faculty is also strongly committed to service and engagement with Indigenous peoples and with vulnerable and marginalized populations in Manitoba and beyond.
