Learning Objectives

In agreement with the adopted statement in 2008 on marching bands by the College Band Directors Association (CBDNA), by participating in mandatory tasks associated with rehearsing, memorizing, and performing music and drill for up to 7 different halftime shows, rehearsing, memorizing, and performing music for the stands and other events, performing community service, performing at various rallies for the university and the community, and adhering to the guidelines set forth in the marching band handbook, the 300 students (of diverse majors and backgrounds) will learn teamwork and collaboration, leadership, large organizational structure, artistry, creativity, physical fitness, musicianship, spatial awareness, professionalism, responsibility, accountability, historical knowledge, communication, pedagogical skills, and discipline.

Major Assignments/Exams

All rehearsals, games, and required performances shall serve as assignments for this course as outlined in the member handbook (which each student owns and signs for). No final exam is given, but attendance and participation shall affect the student's grade as outlined in said handbook.

Twice during the fall semester, students will submit online a paper (minimum two pages, double-spaced) assessing the students' knowledge and opinion on the following aspects of the marching band season to that point:

- 1) How has each show attempted to connect with the various constituencies of audience members in attendance at each football game?
- 2) How has learning of each show and participation in additional performances affected your ability to work as a team with students from differing socio-economic and ethnic backgrounds with varying academic interests?
- 3) How has the process of learning music improved your understand of your musical instrument, the marching band, and music as a genre
- 4) How have the shows learned to this point differed from shows one might encounter with marching bands from the 1950's to this point in time?

Papers will be graded on their adherence to the minimum page length and their ability to address each question asked.

In addition to the above assignment and participating in the normal activities associated with a university marching band, students in this course will gain better understanding of their social responsibility by attending one of several community service opportunities such as volunteer work with a local charitable organization, performances for community health organizations in the neighboring Third Ward, or other performances that the band will make to support efforts in the surrounding community.

Students are graded by their participation in at least one of these community events.
