Course description:

This is a course in developing your skills in listening to and understanding music. Your acquisition of these skills is measured in two ways: (1) your ability to vocally reproduce musical patterns and melodies, and (2) your ability to accurately transcribe music upon hearing it. The former is generally known as "sight singing" (although it does not always involve singing music on sight); the latter is known as dictation. You will be tested in each of these areas in class (by singing in class and taking dictation guizzes) and on exams (a midterm and a final). Everyone will be heard singing in class on a regular basis. Keep in mind: this is not a course in singing; we will not discuss vocal technique in any meaningful detail, and you will not be evaluated on your vocal quality.

- Horvit, Koozin, and Nelson. Music for Ear Training (2001).
- Pencils, erasers, and music manuscript paper. [A packet of 8.5 x 11 manuscript paper in various formats is available at the University Copy Center (in the University Center). Use these as masters from which you may make as many photocopies as needed. Ask for packet no. 46, or ask for it under my name and the course number (MUSI 1310).] If you use a notebook for class notes, it may be useful to have a notebook of manuscript paper.

Attendance:

- This is a course in skill development, and thus your regular attendance is crucial.
- You are allowed four absences for any reason.
- Beyond this number, each absence will lower your grade one level (e.g., an A becomes an A-, a C+ becomes a C, etc.).

Evaluation:

- Singing: 50% (in-class singing 25%, midterm 12.5%, final exam 12.5%). Everyone will be heard singing in class once per week, during most weeks in the semester. You are responsible for learning and coming to class prepared to sing any assigned material.
- Dictation: 50% (in-class guizzes 25%, midterm 12.5%, final exam 12.5%)
- **IMPORTANT:** in order to pass the course you must earn a passing grade in **both** the singing and dictation portions of the course.

Grade distribution will be according to the standard scale of percentages, as follows:

• A: 92.5-100

A-: 90.0-92.5

• B+: 87.5-90.0

• B: 82.5-87.5

• B-: 80.0-82.5

• C+: 77.5-80.0

• C: 72.5-77.5

• C-: 70.0-72.5

• D+ 67.5-70.0

• D: 62.5-67.5

• D-: 60.0-62.5

• F: below 60.0

NOTE: a grade of at least C- is necessary to continue in the theory and ear-training course sequence.
