COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

The course continues the material begun in Graduate Theory Review I in order to ensure success in upper-level theory and history courses in the school of music's graduate program. In Graduate Theory Review II, students will acquire analytic skills in approaching complex tonal works; become familiar with important compositional techniques employed by composers of post-tonal music; and become familiar with a variety of canonic works from the eighteenth through the twenty-first centuries.

PREREQUISITES

Graduate standing in music; Graduate Theory Review I or permission of the instructor.

Additional scores and other material will be distributed in class or posted on the course web page as needed.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

Homework: homework assignments are listed and explained on the course schedule online. You must also expect to come to class familiar with the assigned pieces and be ready to discuss them insightfully. All assignments are due at the beginning of class on the date indicated on the schedule, and the due dates are not negotiable. Note that you are responsible for the work assigned in class even if you are absent from class, and that the assignment is still due on the date indicated—you must monitor the schedule online to see what material was assigned, and you should obtain notes on the relevant material from a classmate.

Exams: The tonal analysis unit (fugues and sonata forms) will be evaluated in a short (one class period) midterm exam. The final exam will be comprehensive and will cover the topics from the tonal and post-tonal analysis units, including material presented during the group presentations. The date of the final exam is established by the University registrar and is not flexible (see this web page).

Also: Make-up exams will only be given if you provide a written, valid excuse for why you missed the exam. If you cannot do this, your grade for the missed exam will be 0.
