Based in Washington and led by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), the center is staffed with law enforcement officials from Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) and subject matter experts and support staff from 16 DHS components—all focused on the "4 Ps" of the center's mission: prevention, protection, prosecution, and partnerships.

1:30 pm: Exploitation of Unaccompanied Alien Children: The Vetting Process

Synopsis: Tara Lee Rodas served as a federal employee for more than 20 years. While serving at the Pomona Fairplex Emergency Intake Site in Pomona, California, Tara volunteered to help place Unaccompanied Children with sponsors in the United States. Tara saw, firsthand, how lack of transparency, lack of oversight, flawed policies, and deficiencies in HHS' Unaccompanied Children Program resulted in children being placed with suspicious sponsors and suspected trafficking rings throughout the United States.

Ms. Rodas testified as a whistleblower before the House Judiciary Subcommittee on *Immigration Integrity, Security, and Enforcement* on how open-border policies enable the *exploitation of Unaccompanied Alien Children.*

3:30 pm Waiting for You Online: Media Platforms and Human Trafficking

Synopsis: Online recruitment has existed for as long as there has been widespread access to internet platforms. The National Human Trafficking Hotline has recorded recruitment in all types of sex and labor trafficking on social media platforms. Traffickers may build an intimate relationship with a victim through social media. Traffickers will often share their exploits, as well as other useable evidence on their social media. This discussion will focus on using their social media to exploit their behavior and hold them criminally accountable.

8:00 am The Traverse Project: Combating Human Trafficking using Cybersecurity and Intelligence Analyst Tools and Techniques

Synopsis: Human trafficking producer nations are often developing and do not have the resources to combat the organizations that traffic humans globally. Methods used to combat human trafficking need to be focused, data driven, coordinated, measurable, and intelligence-based because the networks that fuel global human trafficking are constantly getting better at avoiding detection. Traverse Project is approaching the problem from a different perspective; we are utilizing skill sets of cybersecurity professionals and intelligence analysts to focus their work to combat trafficking. Our Civil Cyber Defense volunteers and university students utilize data analytics, academic resources, and intelligence gathering tools to identify, map, and disrupt the transnational networks that support human trafficking.

10:30 am Case Study: The Use of OSINT to Detect and Unravel Human Trafficking Networks

Synopsis: This presentation highlights the power of including open-source into the framework of an investigations process and how that data can provide a different perspective understanding of the criminal activity being investigated. The presenters organize the spectrum of human trafficking to five major components: Commercial Sex, Labor Trafficking, Child Sex Trafficking, Organ Harvesting, and all other forms of Exploitation. Accessing information that is publicly available through advertisements,

social media platforms and the dark web is a powerful tool to provide context to an otherwise vague investigation. By adding non-traditional, open-source intelligence, investigators can see an activity, person, organization, action, event, or product through a different lens

1:00 pm Pathway – Centralized Access to Human Trafficking Services
