"PUSHING" THROUGH THE POLITICS OF DIFFERENCE:

How Race, Class, and Gender Hierarchies Shape How We are Born

Recent anthropological scholarship on "new midwifery" focuses on how professional midwives in various countries are helping women reconnect with "nature," teaching them to trust in their bodies, respecting women's "choices," confronting and defying hegemonic biomedical structures, and fighting for women's right to birth as naturally as possible. Rosalynn A. Vega uses ethnographic accounts of natural birth practices in Mexico to complicate these narratives about new midwifery and illuminate larger questions of female empowerment, citizenship, and the commodification of indigenous culture, by contrasting the vastly different birthing experiences of upper-class and indigenous Mexican women, and showing how alternative birth actually reinscribes traditional racial and gender hierarchies.
