The Experience of Laudianism in the Archdeaconry of Nottingham

"Laudianism" is a controversial, but widely used, term that refers to the theological, ecclesiastical, liturgical and other policies predominant in the Church of England in the 1630s and most commonly associated with Archbishop William Laud and like-minded clergymen. This presentation investigates how Laudianism unfolded at the parish level in the Archdeaconry of Nottingham. More specifically, it analyzes patterns of continuity and change with regard to the behavior of clergymen, churchwardens and lay persons from the late sixteenth century through the mid seventeenth century in order to test common assumptions about Laudianism and its impact.
