

CADET SUMMER TRAINING - ADVANCED CAMP

MS-III Cadets from the Houston Battalion traveled to Fort Knox, Kentucky for Advanced Camp. The Cadets went through 35 days of training that spanned eleven regiments over the course of the academic summer. The training completed by Cadets is essential for rising Army Second Lieutenants as they teach Cadets basic Soldier knowledge and essential leadership skills. Training included individual events such as day/night land navigation, M4 weapons' qualification, rappelling, and tactical combat casualty care. Moving on to the second phase of camp, Cadets participated in three field training exercises (FTX), each lasting three days. Cadets conducted missions such as platoon attacks, raids, react to contact, and patrol bases at night. At the end of the final FTX, Cadets must complete a 12-mile ruck march. CADET SUMMER TRAINING - BASIC CAMP

This summer, three MS-II Cadets from the Houston Battalion went to Fort Knox, Kentucky to attend Basic Camp. Basic Camp provides Cadets with skills that will develop their junior leadership skills. Throughout 32 days, Cadets are expected to lead teams of three to four Cadets and squads ranging anywhere from 9-13 Cadets. Some Cadets are given the opportunity to lead a platoon of approximately 50 Cadets. Basic Camp Cadets are trained by drill sergeants in basic Soldier skills including drill and ceremony, basic rifle marksmanship, day/night land navigation, and movement tactics. Basic Camp is aimed at lateral entry Cadets and freshmen. "Lateral Entry Cadets typically decide to join ROTC in their sophomore year of college, thus require Basic Camp to learn what normal-progression Cadets have learned in their first two years of military science classes, during their freshman and sophomore years of Army ROTC" (Cadet Command).
