This course looks at how “crips”—whether disabled upon birth or later in life, whether long-term or short-term, whether in life or fiction—experience and (re)shape the world according to their individual hopes and fears and looks at how academic frameworks, historical knowledge, and literature can facilitate sophisticated understandings of the social construction called disability. Rooted in queer, feminist, and critical theory, this course uses the lens of intersectionality and positionality to study disability in the United States—with due attention to age, appearance, class, family, gender, language, location, race, religion, and sexuality.
