*Some universities require Philosophy 1301. Students may take either a fine arts class or a humanities class for ADN but both are required for BSN.

The core curriculum at Houston Community College includes 43 semester hours.

Communication skills (9 hours) All students must complete English composition I and II (ENGL 1301 and 1302). They must also earn three hours' credit in speech/ communication. Students can satisfy the requirement by taking COMM 1307, a speech course, or any 1400-level language course, such as SPAN 1411 or FREN 1411. Business majors should select SPCH 1321, business and professional speaking.

English literature (3 hours) Students must complete one literature course, which is any 2300-level English course except for ENGL 2307, 2308, 2311, and 2389. Students should keep in mind that ENGL 1301 and ENGL 1302 are both prerequisites for literature.

Mathematics (3 hours) The HCC Core curriculum includes three hours of mathematics. Most students will satisfy the requirement with college algebra, MATH 1314. Liberal arts majors may prefer instead to take MATH 1322, which is math for liberal arts; it is less challenging than college algebra. Students majoring in education, business, science, pre-med, architecture, engineering, and a number of other fields must take college algebra and other math classes as well, depending on their field of study.

Natural sciences (7 hours) The core curriculum includes two natural science courses, at least one of which must have a lab. Students may choose from biology, chemistry, environmental science, geology, physics, and ANTH 2301 (Introduction to Physical Anthropology). Students majoring in health careers will take biology and maybe chemistry as well. Education majors will take lab courses in both biology and geology. Future engineers will take courses in physics. Students majoring in liberal arts and business should take courses designed for non-science majors, such as ANTH 2301, BIOL 1308, CHEM 1411, ENVR 1401, and geology classes.

Social sciences (15 hours) State law requires that students have six hours of government (GOVT 2301 and 2302) and six hours of history (HIST 1301, 1302, and 2301—choose any two). The core curriculum includes an additional social science course. Students may select from a long list of anthropology (all but ANTH 2301), economics (all but 1301), geography, government, history, psychology, and sociology courses as well as TECA 1354, which is Child Growth and Development.

Fine arts (3 hours) Students must successfully complete a three-hour course in fine arts. These courses include all ARTS, DANC, DRAM, MUSC, MUSI, MUAP, and MUSP courses.

Cross/multicultural studies (3 hours) The core curriculum includes a three-hour cross/multicultural studies course. Students may choose from a long list that includes many anthropology, arts, literature, sociology, humanities, geography, philosophy, sociology, and language courses.

Faculty advising students about core issues should keep in mind that many courses will satisfy more than one part of the core. A student can take Spanish 1411, for example, to complete either the communication skills or the cross/multicultural component of the core. A single course cannot satisfy both core requirements, but a student could accomplish that goal by completing SPAN 1411 and SPAN 1412.
