TAM EARNS ASHP LIT AWARD FOR SUSTAINED CONTRIBUTIONS

UHCOP Professor Vincent H. Tam, Pharm.D., BCPS (AQ-ID), FIDSA, has been recognized with the 2019 American Society of Health-System Pharmacists (ASHP) Foundation Literature Award for Sustained Contributions.

Presented to Tam during the 2019 ASHP Midyear Clinical Meeting in Las Vegas, the award "recognizes a pharmacist with a 20-year record of publishing high quality and impactful peer-reviewed biomedical literature."

Tam has authored/coauthored more than 160 papers in peer-reviewed journals since 2001, including a May 2014 paper published in the journal Antimicrobial Agents and Chemotherapy that was recognized as the Pharmacotherapy Paper of the Year



Award by the Society of Infectious Diseases Pharmacists. He also served as coauthor of the "International Consensus Guidelines for the Optimal Use of the Polymyxins" in the journal *Pharmacotherapy*, endorsed by several U.S. and international organizations.

Tam has received research support from

such entities as the National Institutes of Health and the National Science Foundation, and is a co-inventor on U.S. patents for novel formulations of polymyxin B and a rapid diagnostic system to help guide rational dosing of antimicrobials at the bedside.

A past member of the SIDP Board of Directors, Tam also was the first pharmacist elected to the National Foundation for Infectious Diseases' Board of Directors. In 2018, Tam was inducted as a Fellow of the Infectious Diseases Society of America.

His other honors include the UH Excellence in Research and Scholarship Award and team member of the ASHP Best Practices Award-winning CHI Baylor St. Luke's Medical Center's Center for Antimicrobial Stewardship and Epidemiology.

College to Host ID Fellowship Forum, SPAC Events for First Time in June

UHCOP will pick up first-time hosting honors for this year's Infectious Diseases Pharmacotherapy Fellowship Forum and the Southern Pharmacy Administration Conference (SPAC).

UHCOP will welcome ID fellows and mentors from across the nation to the Marriott Marquis Houston in downtown June 4-7. The program will feature moderated podium presentations by fellows as well as panel discussions and keynote addresses by leading ID faculty focusing on career and research developments.

Dozens of faculty and students also are expected for SPAC 2020, which will be held June 11-13 at UHCOP's Health 2 Building. Abstracts for e-poster or podium presentation are being accepted unitl April 4, with all accepted abstracts to be published in the journal *Research in Social and Administrative Pharmacy*. Registration opens March 2 and closes May 8. Bernard Harris, M.D., former NASA astronaut, CEO of the National Math + Science Initiative, and UH alumnus, will be the keynote speaker. 


AMCP/IPhO Round Table
