


CIR Academic Accomplishments

GPA Incentives


- The CIR Recovery Scholarship is an earned award, requiring students to have a 3.0 GPA for both fall and spring semesters prior to the award and one year of continuous recovery.
- The CIR Recovery Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$3,000 split between fall and spring semesters.
- FY 18 was the third year CIR offered the Recovery Scholarship to community members awarding <u>11</u> <u>students \$20,000 in scholarships</u>
- FY 18 was the first year CIR offered a Recovery Housing Scholarship, awarding two students \$10,000 to reside in the recovery housing component of the CIR program


CIR Graduation and Retention Rates


CIR Graduating Class of 2017-2018

CIR Accomplishments

- Ten students graduated in FY 18
- Six out of the nine graduates secured a position in the workforce prior to graduation
- FY 18 average CIR community GPA 3.18
- CIR developed two new programs, Source of Strength Leadership Program and Career Ready Coogs, geared towards student success
- Successfully hosted the 9th Annual National Collegiate Recovery Conference
- Recovery Housing Scholarship Two \$5,000
- Restructured CIR Recovery Scholarship \$20,000



CIR Program Expansion









- Staffing
 - CIR is a team of two staff that serves 60 students that suffer from Substance use and mental health disorders and they need more attention than the average student
 - According to the Association of Recovery in Higher Education, the staff to student ration should be 1:25
- Recovery Housing
 - More beds are needed to meet the demand for substance free housing from the CIR community Members



Needs

• Funding for Coordinator Position/Additional Staff

- Currently, the coordinator position is being funded by dollars from private donors. If this position's salary and benefits was eventually funded through SFAC funding, it would free up nearly \$50,000 that could go toward more programming and scholarships for community members.
- Scholarships
 - Academics/Housing
 - A majority of community members either work full-time or part-time jobs for supplemental income to their financial aid to cover tuition and housing costs



 - First year to receive this award




CIR FY18 Budget
