The Dance Division acquired a new dance studio solely for dance usage, and a performance space that is shared with Theatre in 2006. Currently, we have plans in the School of Theatre & Dance for additional classroom spaces. Dance now has 2.5 dance studio spaces and shares two performance spaces with Theatre.

One more element is a need for faculty offices for the School of Theatre & Dance. Currently, 2-3 professors share most of our offices. No other department on the UH campus operates under these conditions, and the demands of one-on-one coaching and mentoring are not realistically possible in this situation. At this time, we need at least eight additional faculty offices.
