# **PLEASE NOTE:**

An undergraduate BA design/technology emphasis already exists as a part of the older comprehensive track within the School of Theatre & Dance. The transition from a BA to a BFA degree will bring the Production track in line with the other degree offerings of the School of Theatre & Dance. The BFA allows both a stronger focus on professionally applicable training and the opportunity for students to broaden their horizons by taking courses in allied disciplines.

This New Program Request Form is intended to provide a change in the track title, from "design/technology" to "Production". Additionally, we have made to the curriculum to improve courses taught and the curricular progression of those courses.

Changes and revisions to the curricular progression of this track will create a better through line of training. This progression will more effectively prepare students for success in the production areas of the professional theatre.

The broader focus of our undergraduate production programs will better prepare students for the specialized, in-depth training offered at the graduate level in the areas of design and technology.

The continued integration of modern technology into our training program will provide students with the job skills that are in immediate demand in the industry.

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The offering of a BFA degree will attract qualified, motivated students, and the modified 4-year curriculum will improve our retention and graduation rates.

# **Program Information**

### I. Need

In review of trade papers locally and nationally (ArtSearch, etc) production related positions, including technology and design, dominate the job market.

Requests consistently come to our faculty from professional venues for skilled production, technology, and design students and graduates. Further, crossover exists between this area and the much of the entertainment industry including sound and lighting for film and

television, cruise ships, etc. This expands the potential job market greatly for graduates of this program.

B. <u>Student Demand</u> – Provide short- and long-term evidence of demand for the program.

The BFA offered in the Production track will make the UH School of Theatre & Dance highly competitive and attractive within the state of Texas and nationally.

The track will attract stronger students to the program – and provide a structure that will allow students to graduate in four years. This will aid students in committing to the UH graduation pledge, as well as increase our retention and graduation rates.

Towards the end of their academic training students need the ability to focus on their area of specialty, as well as begin to integrate into the professional market. The BFA program allows for such focus and specialization.

Upon completion of their degree, our students will be better trained to enter the professional market, which will ensure a greater potential for success in theatre and related fields.

Current library holdings are sufficient for the needs of this program. Going forward, program faculty will coordinate with the theatre area librarian in order to make sure that future book, music, and graphic/video purchases reflect the needs of the students and faculty.

E. <u>Facilities and Equipment</u> – Describe the availability and adequacy of facilities and equipment to support the program. Describe plans for facility and equipment improvements/additions.

A new sound system and recording/editing lab in the Wortham Theatre is needed. The current, antiquated sound system is unreliable and inadequate. It is some 25+ years out of date with current technology, and therefore no longer serves as an adequate training tool for undergraduates or graduate production students. The projected cost of a new system is \$250,000.00. It will be best to install the needed equipment within the next two years. Currently, there is no funding source identified.

Likewise, the lighting equipment available to students has been outpaced by technology. We need to acquire intelligent (moving) luminaires, upgrade the dimming capacity of the Quintero Lab Theatre, and replace outdated control consoles with current models. While we have some existing arrangements with manufacturers and suppliers for "loaners", the projected cost of acquiring equipment is \$150,000.

Both the sound and lighting items cited above are expensive, with no current funding identified. While the program can go forward in the short run without the system

upgrades, in the long run the proposed BFA program and the broader and production program will suffer without the ability to learn and use the technology that is current in a rapidly-changing field.

Program needs in the costume and scenic studios consist largely of replacing worn-out equipment and upgrading safety standards. The costume shop needs to replace an ineffective vent hood (spray booth), replace sewing machines, and acquire embroidery machines at a total cost of \$22,400. The safety concerns in the scenic studio addresses improved lighting (the current lighting is original to the building and the campus electricians can no longer acquire adequate replacement parts) and replace two major bench tools. The total estimate is \$20,000.

Since our past small computer lab was displaced by space reallocations and the equipment fell behind the curve, we need to reestablish and reequip the lab. We need more computers and software for production students. Needed are 12 Imacs, each equipped with updated design and technology software such as Peak [sound], Photoshop, Illustrator, and Painter [design] and VectorWorks [scenic and lighting design and drafting], along with associated digitizing, scanning and plotting equipment). The projected cost of equipment is \$30,000.00. The projected cost of software is \$8,000.00. It will be best to acquire the needed equipment and software within the next two years. Currently, there is no funding source available beyond the University of Houston Technology Funds. Our recent allocations from these funds would not cover the costs within three years and would completely displace other broader School technology needs.

The School of Theatre & Dance is pursuing Full Membership with URTA (University/Resident Theatre Association). Our official application with URTA was submitted in December 2008, and an official file has been opened for the University of Houston School of Theatre & Dance.

We plan to schedule the URTA Campus Review for November 2009. The external review normally requires two days, and occurs when there is a full production in performance for the Review Team to attend. The URTA process models other external reviews including assessment of curriculum, facilities, equipment, dialogue with faculty and students, etc
