A. How does the proposed course meet the appropriate Exemplary Educational Objectives (see **Guidelines**). Attach a syllabus and supporting materials for the objectives the syllabus does not make clear.

Spanish 3384 is the first course in the sequence offered by the Department of Hispanic Studies that focuses specifically on learning to read literature written in Spanish using the standard methods of literary criticism. In lower-level courses in the Department of Hispanic Studies students read short literary works, but more for the purpose of practicing the language, than for analysis. In Spanish 3384, students are introduced to the particularities of the four main literary genres -- narrative, poetry, drama, and the essay. The works studied were all originally written in Spanish by authors from Latin America, the United States, and Spain. In each class, students discuss the reading assignment guided by questions found both in the textbook, and provided by the instructor. The questions are geared to encourage critical thinking about the text, and not plot summary. All the texts are taught incorporating lessons on the cultural context of the country, time, and author that produced the work. The students are expected to incorporate this information into their analysis of the literary work. The course has at least two exams that include essay questions to test the students' abilities to think critically about the works they have read, and to express these thoughts in a wellorganized essay written in advanced, grammatically correct Spanish. In addition to the exams, each student will write 2 or 3 (depending on the instructor) research papers on works studied in the classroom. Students are instructed on the use of the MLA International Bibliography, and similar bibliographical databases from a number of Spanish-speaking countries, to find at least 3 critical sources that will inform their paper. In order to receive a good grade, the student must demonstrate the ability to think critically and go beyond the level of the class discussion in his or her research paper.

The Department of Hispanic Studies has a system of online course evaluations that are processed every semester.

Students routinely write comments on the amount and type of writing required for each course. These comments are returned to individual instructors who are expected to take the students' comments into consideration.

Course Requirements:

- 1. ATTENDANCE. No more than three absences. Lateness of twenty minutes or more constitutes an absence. We shall be covering a great deal of material, so it is extremely inadvisable to miss class.
- 2. PARTICIPATION. Students are expected to read carefully the assigned text(s) for each class and to be ready for discussion. The quality of each class depends on your readiness to pose questions, give interpretations, and/or challenge differing views with your own ideas. You will be asked to work in groups and give informal presentations.
- 3. PAPERS. Writing assignments are crucial elements of this course because they are designed as exercises in analytical reading to extend the students' writing skills beyond the level of mere grammar since this is not primarily a language class. Students may not receive a final grade higher than justified by the quality of their writing.
 - **Two** papers will be assigned during the semester. Papers must be at least 4 pages in length, in Spanish, typed and double-spaced. They must be carefully researched with a bibliography of at least 3 scholarly sources. Students must submit a rough draft ahead of time to help improve their writing. In order to get a good grade, students must demonstrate the ability to think critically and go beyond the level of the class discussion in the research paper.
- 4. EXAMINATIONS. There will be one midterm and one final examination consisting of essay questions on the texts. If you follow along, you should have no trouble with the exams.
