Critical Thinking:

Students will write a four page paper in which they will critically analyze a work of art, architecture, or other object of visual culture. Students will use the essay subject as evidence for a wider argument on the ideas, values and beliefs of the culture that produced the work. The research and writing process will elicit critical thinking in the formation and marshaling of the argument. Detailed analysis of visual evidence will also encourage critical argument from evidence.

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In the same four page paper above, students will demonstrate their ability to communicate effectively.

In the same four page paper, students will explore issues of social responsibility through the examination of the social function of visual culture.						
Personal Responsibility: In the same four page paper, students will explore the rights and responsibilities of forming part of a modern urban artworld.						

Inclusion in the core is contingent upon the course being offered and taught at least once every other academic year. Courses will be reviewed for renewal every 5 years.

The department understands that instructors will be expected to provide student work and to participate in university-wide assessments of student work. This could include, but may not be limited to, designing instruments

such as rubrics, and scoring work by students in this or other courses. In addition, instructors of core courses may be asked to include brief assessment activities in their course.
